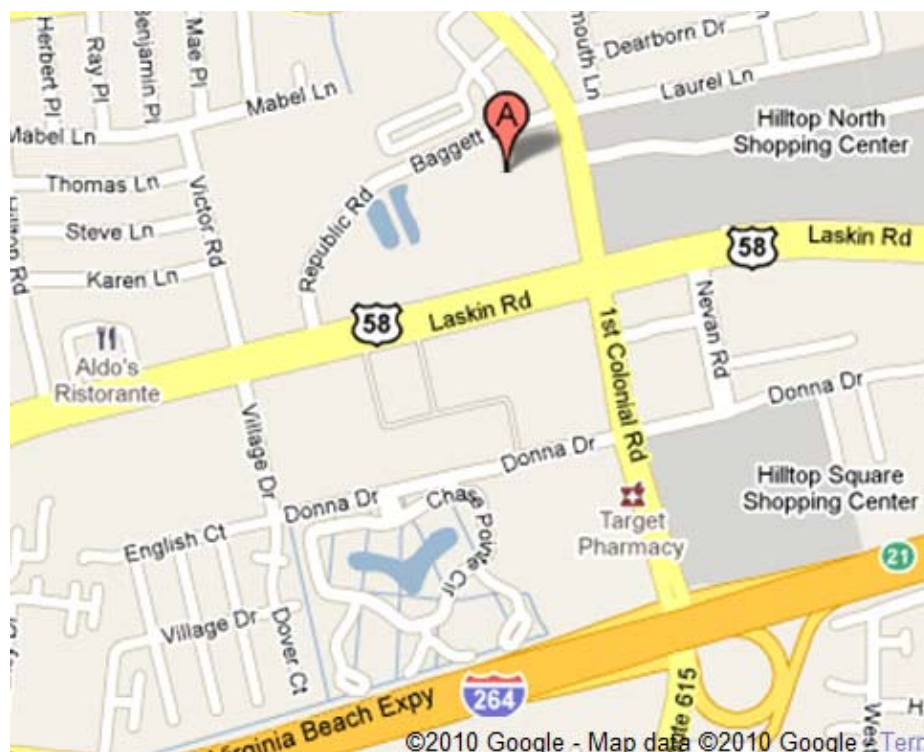

Thank you Lynn for all your hard work on the float, and Roxanne for donating her trailer and offering her driving talent. Let's hope 2011 St. Pat's Parade will be sunny and dry!

Williamsburg Dog Walk April 25, 2010 (2 PM) (Sunday)

CTC Fun Day June 12, 2010 (Saturday)

Lynn reported that everything was in place for CTC Fun Day at Family Dog Club (Chesapeake) on Saturday June 12 from 10-4. Bring a dish, bring a friend, and of course, appropriate supplies for your dog (water, poop bags, ex-pen if desired).

CTC Fun Match September 11, 2010 (Saturday)

Lynn asked Glenis to report on the duties/time lines of Show Co-Chairperson for the Fun Match. Glenis detailed that one had to find the judges (she has a list), and a letter is generated with the judges' names in June or July. Jane Carroll, Lynn Arnold, and Brad Noyes (prior judges) indicated they would like to judge again. Julie added that Sharlene Pittman had been a "foster mother" to her puppy, and Sharlene had also mentioned how much she enjoyed judging a couple of years back. To keep expenses down, in the past judges have been able to do more than one group, so seven judges will not be needed. Judges' gifts must be selected/ordered in July or August. Kathy has done the flyers in the past, and flyers need to be distributed at shows dur-

ing the summer. At the end of August, a reminder and informational letter needs to be sent to the selected judges as a reminder. Glenis indicated she bought a pack of tag-board to post for the judging groups (7 + Junior Showmanship). Signs must be made/posted. On Friday night (September 10), rings must be set-up.

CTC Scrapbook

Julie indicated that Central Library (Va. Beach) had one meeting room available on one date (May 18, 6-8 PM) only that the club could use to work on the scrapbook. Ann indicated that a history needs to be prepared and pictures organized. Members didn't feel Central Library would be appropriate in view of only a two hour time limit. Alva Chopp was overwhelmingly endorsed by CTC members and described by her sponsor Glenis as a "delightful" person. Julie moved and Lynne seconded that Alva be approved for membership. The motion passed and Alva was given a hearty CTC welcome.

Pattie McDermott's application was read. She is a friend of Mara and attended the Fun Day, and would like to attend other functions. She has a Scottish Terrier named Finn who is 1 1/2. Lynne read her application. She has had terriers all her life and is a well-informed owner. She volunteers for Siamese Rescue and would like to be active with Wee Beasties. Her application was sponsored by Mara and Lynn, and will be printed in the Lamppost.

Good of the Order

Julie presented information regarding Mr. Wiggles Pantry, which is in conjunction with the Southeastern Food Bank and is designed to provide pet food for a month for families who present certification of need. While she has not been able to contact the sponsor directly, despite several attempts, contact with the Southeastern Food Bank revealed the sponsor is not connected with PETA or HSUS. This may be a good community service for CTC and if members would like to support this cause, information could be placed on Match Show flyers regarding Mr. Wiggles Pantry. Julie

will continue to try to get more information.

Mara is sponsoring a fundraiser for SPCA at the Jewish Mother on April 22, with the theme of Celtic Belly Dancing. She is hoping for a nice crowd (and donations!).

Judy reported she is going to Cancun next week. Members wished her a great time!

Mara had a heartwarming story, which also emphasized the benefits of microchipping. A Westie was stolen from a kennel in England in the Fall of 2008, to be discovered and returned after one and one-half years due to current microchip information.

Glenis detailed her trip to Crufts. She attended the show Thursday, Friday, and Sunday, and went sightseeing Wednesday and Saturday. She brought back the Crufts Guide to show club members. There were 25,000 entries over four days! Shopping was fantastic! There were 20 buildings over 25 acres, and right by the train station. Buildings included five halls, the pavillion, and the arena. The rest was SHOPPING!! Hall 3 contained the benched area and Discover Dogs, in which a booth for each breed club was provided, and Glenis indicated the booths were fantastic. Entries included 158 Westies, 164 Jack Russells, 309 Borders, 93 Scotties, 165 Cairns, 78 Smooth Fox, and 61 Wire Fox, and a huge Staffie entry of 218 dogs and 180 bitches requiring two judges for the breed. Glenis joined the Lakeland Club of England, as well as Lakeland Terrier Club Society. The Lakeland that went BOB this year was owner-handled.

Glenis flew overnight, but was ready for sightseeing Wednesday. She saw Warwick Castle, Stratford, and Ann Hathaway's cottage. She

Boarding Fees

While boarding fees in other cities typically start at \$20 a day, the cost of warehousing a pooch in New York usually tops the fee for a Midwestern budget hotel (and at Motel 6, don't forget, pets stay for free). Most spots charge \$50 or more; at Happy Paws Pet Resort in the East Village, a "VIP Themed Suite" with a flat-panel TV, DVD player and turn-down service costs \$115. Then there's the long list of add-ons. The \$300 annual membership fee that some kennels demand is unique to New York, says Joan Saunders, CEO of the national Pet Care Services Association. And the \$10-a-day "holiday surcharge" we pay for boarding our dogs on Memorial Day and Christmas is seldom seen outside the five boroughs.

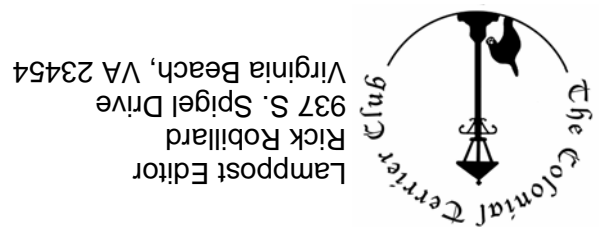
No wonder the business is attracting eager entrepreneurs. Since 2006, the number of licensed boarding kennels in New

York City has jumped 50%, and the scene includes its share of ambitious MBAs.

Joshua Stine, CEO of Running Paws on the Upper East Side, came to the business from Goldman Sachs. Scott Smith, who co-owns the Manhattan chain Biscuits & Bath (and who says he invented the kennel membership fee), is a former McKinsey & Co. operations wonk. His stated ambition is to build a national franchise—he's already up to six locations—and he runs the outfit like a major chain. Clients earn rewards in an elaborate loyalty program (500 points gets Fido a free ear cleaning) and the company's sophisticated website includes a privacy policy and an online application for would-be dog handlers.

Still, kennel owners say that despite the industry's recession-proof nature—spending on pets has been growing steadily at 5% a year—it's a tough, low-margin business.

When I walk Louis over to his favorite kennel, Woofs 'n Whiskers in Red Hook ("The Urban Dog & Cat Retreat"), I always tell him, "You're going to jail!" Sure, the friendly staff makes a big fuss over the animals, and the dogs have a fine time courting the entropy gods in the huge outdoor run, but the business is housed in a former auto body shop. For \$45 a night, Louis gets cinderblock walls, concrete floors and a wire crate. Louis seems to like it. I'm thinking the price should include a gold-plated bone and a facial.
